


November 9th, 2025 *"The Hour Has Come"* John 12:12-26

1.	How might people still use the phrase "Jesus is King" to serve their own ambitions? How does Jesus' actions and death redefine what true kingship and glory mean?
2.	How does Jesus' response in verse 23 "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified"—connect to the Greeks' request? What does this moment teach us about God's heart for the nations?
3.	How do verses 24–25 summarize the paradox of the Christian life? How does the image of the grain of wheat help us think about suffering, service, or sacrifice in the Christian life?
4.	How were you challenged by Jesus' words in John 12:24-26? In your own life, how have you been tempted to soften or excuse away this command of Jesus?
	Discuss the poem included in the bulletin "The Valley of Vision" (also included at the end of these questions)

5. What promises does Jesus make to His servants in verse 26? How do these promises

motivate us to faithfulness?
