The Knowledge of God

Psalm 139

1. Which point from Sunday's sermon challenged, convicted, or encouraged you the most?
2. Take time to read the entirety of Psalm 139 out loud – what do you notice? What truths about God are precious to you?
3. How does Psalm 139 correct the common idea that God only notices "big" events in our lives? Why do you think David views God's exhaustive knowledge as comforting instead of frightening?
4. Throughout Scripture, "to know" often refers to intimate relationship (Gen. 4:1), not merely information. Why is that distinction important? How does the Hebrew idea of *yada* deepen your understanding of God's relationship with His people? (Psalm 139:2, 4, 23-24)
5. Romans 5:8 says Christ died for us while we were still sinners. How does knowing that God loved you while fully aware of every sin deepen your appreciation for His perfect knowledge of you?
6. David responds to God's omniscience with worship rather than fear (Psalm 139:6). Why do you think his response is one of awe?
7. How should God's perfect knowledge shape the way you pray this week?
